TOPIC 1: The Truth About Tariffs: Who Really Pays?

Tariffs—taxes on imported goods—are often used by governments to protect domestic industries or as leverage in international negotiations. Supporters argue that tariffs protect local jobs and businesses from foreign competition. Critics say they raise prices for consumers, invite retaliation, and hurt economic growth.

In your entry, choose one specific tariff policy (from the past or present) and analyze its impact on individuals, businesses, and the economy. Discuss how the tariff policy you chose affected prices, jobs, consumer choice, and trade relationships, and explain who benefitted from the policy and who paid the price. Reflect on how tariff policies might affect your own life, family, or community today.

TOPIC 2: The Birthright Citizenship Debate

Under the current interpretation of the 14th Amendment, anyone born on U.S. soil is automatically a U.S. citizen, regardless of their parents' immigration status. Known as birthright citizenship, this principle has been widely accepted in the U.S. for over a century. A new legal challenge may soon bring this issue before the Supreme Court.

In your entry, explain what the authors of the 14th Amendment intended when they proposed the amendment, and evaluate whether birthright citizenship reflects those goals. Should the interpretation continue unchanged or should the amendment be reinterpreted? What are the possible positive and negative consequences? Support your argument with historical context, constitutional reasoning, and evidence from recent court cases and/or public debates. If applicable, connect the issue to your own life or your community.

TOPIC 3: America at 250: Why It Matters to Me

Opponents argue that elections already act as term limits—voters can remove anyone they don't like.

In your entry, take a position on whether term limits should be enacted for members of Congress, and explain why you took that position. Have you ever felt like leaders stayed too long? What would be the advantages and disadvantages of term limits? How might term limits affect the balance of power in government, and the way laws get made?

Support your argument with historical examples, constitutional principles, and current events. You may also reflect on your personal experiences with government.
